Charleston Jul 19th 1860

Dear Tom

I read a letter from you a few days ago, giving your reasons for not taking Nancy. I never like to persuade anyone to do what he dont think is right or what [unclear] able to do. I should like very much to meet you all there but you know your circumstances better than I do. I suppose John and family will be there. We will try and get away from the [unclear]th to the 10th of August. Will stay a day or two in New York. Am thinking some of buying the Great Eastern. I hope it wont leave till I get there. We have had the hottest summer I ever knew, a great many died from heat. It is still quite hot but much more pleasant than it has been. Our little girl has been quite puny for some time, I am very anxious to get away on her account, I think a sea voyage and change of air will do her good.

Kate has been better for the last two months than she has been for years I do hope it will continue.

Tell John Mr. Douglas enquires about him every once in a whilte.

Tell Red Douglas it would do me a great deal of good to hear of his taking off his Coat and rolling up his sleeves for Breckenridge and Lane. I think he told me he was going to Ohio this summer, if he does I hope I will meet him there.

Remember me in love to your wife and children, also John and Family. Nate joins in much love to all.
